

Planes, Automobiles... res but no Trains #1 By John Hunter

A quirky look, over a couple of articles. at two star-studded British comedies from the 1960s, both written and directed by 'Bond' alumni Ken Annakin, both featuring a race between vintage machines, both with the same composer, and both having many of the same stars and characters. First to

the starting line in 1965 was 'Those Magnificent Men in their Flying Machines' which told the (partly true) story of an air race in 1910 between various European machines (pre -dating the Schneider trophy race by quite a few years!). Amongst a host of British comedy stars; Terry Thomas, Eric Sykes, Benny Hill, Tony Hancock - and heavy-weight more

thesps: James Fox, Robert Morley and Flora Robson - was token American star Stuart Whitman (looking very much like Troy Tempest from the contemporaneous TV show 'Stingray'), and various Euro-stars flying their own countries planes such as the German Gert Frobe ('Goldfinger') and French Jean-Pierre Cassall.

Actual full sized working aircraft were built representing the various designs of the day (only 'modern' engines ensured increased safety), some still flying from 'Shuttleworth' museum for

many years later - and only some shoddy matte work at times mars the impressive aerial scenes. Accompanying the splendour and mayhem is the music of the great Ron Goodwin (I met him once when he was conducting the BBC Concert Orchestra - he was a childhood hero of mine as a very young musician!) - his opening song is still performed today by bands and choirs, and the spoof 'nationalism' of his characters' 'lietmotifs' is an object lesson in film writing. Goodwin's big hits 'The Battle of Britain' and 'Where Eagles Dare'

were yet to come (although he had already made a name with his 'Miss Marple' theme).

Stuart Whitman was not popular on set apparently, and the shoot was beset by some bad weather, but it became a very popular film for all ages and certainly brought to the public's attention an almost forgotten era of aviation pioneering. You will notice we mentioned TWO similar films at the outset - the

other features vintage automobiles and set two decades later, but with mostly the same cast and story - and as you'll see here, the same cartoonists' work adorning both the poster and opening credits - we'll take a closer look next time. This article's movie poser is therefore twofold - who is this famous British cartoonist whose most famous 'creation' were the awful 'St Trinians' girls - and also, what is the name of the film's 'sequel'? CLUE - its American release title is very similar to this one, but strangely its British one was not!





International Caving Exhibition in Hawes

Where in the world is most like the Yorkshire Dales National Park? The best answer is possibly Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Park in Vietnam, as illustrated in the latest special exhibition at the Dales Countryside Museum in Hawes.

"Underground worlds - caves of the Yorkshire Dales and Vietnam" showcases how both national parks have large tracts of limestone underfoot and boast some of the world's largest and longest cave systems. The exhibition was officially opened in October and will run until 4 January.

Featuring top class photography and video footage of cavers and caving systems in the Yorkshire Dales and Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Parks, the exhibition celebrates 35 years of exploration and exchange between British and Vietnamese cavers.

Chair of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, Derek Twine, opened the exhibition, remembering "being a kid coming up from the southeast of England" in the 1970s to stay at Whernside Manor to try caving. He said: "We are very proud of this exhibition. Caves are one of the undersold, or hidden, special qualities of the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

"We might be 6000 miles apart, but we have been learning from each other. Phong Nha-Ke Bang is probably the best-preserved limestone cave system in the world. In the Yorkshire Dales, we've got the longest cave system in Britain.

"An international caving community began in 1990 when Howard and Deb Limbert were given permission by the Vietnamese government to lead parties of cavers in explorations. That led to the discovery of

the expanse of the caves.
"Full compliments to those who put this

exhibition together. We are grateful to the film makers and photographers who have kindly presented their work for free at this exhibition."

The partnership between the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority and Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Park has developed from a cooperation agreement established in January 2024.

Mr. Dinh Huy Tri, Deputy Director of the Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Park Management Board said: "The exhibition is very impressive, very special, and not just for the caving, but how it presents the history, conservation values and the indigenous people of Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Park. We are hoping to build our first interpretation centre in the National Park, and the partnership with the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority

means we can learn much that will help us to progress our plans and ultimately secure funding."

Ms. Nguyen Ha Dung, the Deputy General Director of Oxalis Adventure, which offers caving tours in Phong Nha,



said: "This is the first time I've been in England. I'm very happy to be here today. It's a moving experience. I would like to use this opportunity to thank all the British cave explorers who came to Vietnam, especially Howard and Deb Limbert. We've been able to develop sustainable tourism, and we would like to thank the Yorkshire Dales National Park and Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Park for their support."

The Yorkshire Dales National Park has three show caves where people can get underground without crawling or expertise: Ingleborough Cave near Clapham, Stump Cross Caverns near Greenhow and White Scar Cave near Ingleton. For the more adventurous, there are caving clubs including Bradford Pothole Club and Craven Pothole Club.



Public Views Sought on Funding for Essential Council Services

Residents and businesses have been urged to help to shape our financial plans and outline their priorities for a host of services amid growing concerns over the impact of the Government's reforms on local government funding.

We are responsible for a wide range of essential services from waste collection and recycling to providing social care, education and roads maintenance.

However, we are facing intense financial pressures in a situation mirrored across the local government sector. The deeply rural parts of North Yorkshire mean that providing services to often remote communities increases costs significantly.

These financial pressures are expected to intensify when the Government announces a package of reforms later this year in the way that local government is funded.

Among the greatest pressures on our finances is the need to provide vital support for vulnerable people across the county.

Currently 50 per cent of our overall annual budget of £1.3 billion is used to fund support for vulnerable people - with the largest amount at 32 per cent going on adult social care and health.

A countywide consultation was launched in November to glean the public's views and pinpoint the key priorities for the council's budget for the next financial year and the Council Plan up until 2030. Residents are being encouraged to take part in the Let's Talk Money survey, which will help inform decisions on the council's budget for the 2026/27 financial year.

Council leader, Cllr Carl Les, said: "We are lobbying the Government with support from our MPs to ensure that we get the fairest funding deal possible for North Yorkshire.

"But we are concerned that Ministers do not fully understand the financial issues of running services in such a large rural area. Unless the Government changes its approach, we are likely to be dealing with very significant reductions in the grant we receive.

"We are committed to ensuring we offer the very best value for our taxpayers, and it is vital that we are able to see exactly what people see as the main priorities.

"All councils are facing significant financial challenges, and there are unrelenting demands for services including those for children and young people with special educational needs and adult social care.

"I would urge all our residents and businesses to give their views and have a say in such an important consultation for the county."

We were handed one of the worst funding deals nationally for the current financial year which has led to an unexpected reduction in funding of almost £22 million.

This is due to the loss of £14 million in funding after the Government scrapped the rural services delivery grant as well as an unfunded share of the costs of higher National Insurance contributions.

It is predicted that there will be a total deficit of about £34 million by the end of 2027/28 due to a series of factors including inflation and demand on services, especially adult social care and special educational needs.

The financial deficit is likely to

increase due to proposed changes in the way the Government allocates funds to local councils. Although final figures are not expected to be available until later in December, it is estimated that we are set to lose between £15 million and £20 million under the new arrangements.

Deputy leader, ClIr Gareth Dadd, whose responsibilities include finance, said: "We have always prided ourselves on the fact that our finances have been well managed, which has been so important with the challenges we are facing for our budget.

"The Let's Talk Money survey will give the public the chance to let us know what they see as the priorities for the next financial year. We will listen and take into account all the views and comments we receive, but we cannot rule out that there will be some tough decisions going forward."

Despite the financial challenges, a series of major projects are being introduced across North Yorkshire.

Vital upgrades to infrastructure are under way, including a project with a budget of £82.5 million to create a new stretch of the A59 at Kex Gill. There have been 15 landslips on the key route since 2000 which have caused significant disruption for the public and cost the council more than £6 million to repair. The new stretch of road is due to open next year.

And children and young people with special educational needs and

disabilities (SEND) in North Yorkshire are being supported through a £3 million investment. The council is increasing the number of specialist school places across the county through the funding.

The Let's Talk Money survey is asking people to say how important the council's key priorities of affordable homes, promoting health and wellbeing, providing education and social care support, reducing the impact of climate change, supporting the local economy and transport are to them.

The public will also be asked if they are prepared to support an increase in council tax. Eight out of 10 people who responded to last year's survey said that they would support a rise to help deliver critical services.

The results of the consultation will be included in a report on the proposed budget for the 2026/27 financial year which will be considered by the council's executive in January before a final decision will be made at a full council meeting on February 13 next year.

Reconnecting the floodplain at Hauxwell Estate

A project at Hauxwell Estate near Leyburn is showing how farming and flood management can work hand in hand. Working with <u>Ousewem</u>, the estate has reconnected a watercourse to its floodplain for the first time in more than a century, creating a new nine-hectare wetland and bringing back the natural meanders once common across the Dales (see picture below).

Storing around 2,992 cubic meters of water - more than an Olympic-sized swimming pool - the work slows and stores water in the landscape, reducing flood risk and creating rich habitats for wading birds, insects and amphibians.

"It's been a real pleasure to work with Ousewem on this project. The new wetland fits perfectly with our ambition to manage the estate in a more wildlife-

friendly way," said Kevin Birch, Estate Manager.

Will Dalton, of Hauxwell Estate, added: "The wetland will be transformational to the landscape and nature restoration in the heart of the estate and really enhances what we're trying to achieve with regenerative farming and woodland creation. The Ousewem team and Kevin have worked really hard to design and create a fantastic project and I'm very grateful for the opportunity we've had to do this."

The archaeology and local history group is now in its winter programme with our talks on Zoom and so open to members only. There is no talk in December as we have our Xmas social at Marrick Priory with 'Soup & Puds' always very enjoyable and great value. Talks resume in January with "Peru: Highlights of the Archaeological Record". Following a visit, Jane Harrison will give an illustrated talk about some of the societies that flourished there before the Spanish Conquest. You may join us using the form on the website at https://newswaaq.org/join-us/. The fee is £20 per year, falling to £10 on 1st January for the remainder of the membership year. Most of our talks are recorded and available to members a week or so after the talk.

Last month I looked at local chert quarrying. Continuing the local history theme, Marrick Priory has an interesting history. Now an Outdoor Education and Residential Centre, it was founded around 1150 as a Benedictine Nunnery. It became relatively wealthy with income from fisheries, a corn mill, lead mining tithes, donating around 25% of this to help the poor and needy. This wealth attracted Scots raids in the 14thC. The Priory was so badly "destroyed" in 1318 that it was granted relief from taxes by Edward II. It did not escape the Reformation however. and was closed in 1540, passing into the hands of local landowners; there is much more on the Marrick Priory website marrickpriory.co.uk



Be Wise, Immunise! -**Protect yourself and your** loved ones this winter

NHS Humber and North Yorkshire Integrated Care Board (ICB) is urging residents to protect themselves and their families by getting vaccinated against flu, COVID-19, and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV).



A Year of my Life on a Hill Farm November 2023 - October 2024



I live on a 165-hectare hill farm at the top of Swaledale, near Tan Hill Inn. We have 800 Swaledale sheep, 20 cows and 5 border collie sheep dogs - one of them being my own. It is never easy with the harsh conditions the weather throws at us, but it is always a fun experience and has become the way of life.

Unlike the Gregorian calendar, which is from January to December, our farming calendar is from November to October, as this is when the livestock cycle begins.

Tupping time - November

This is an incredibly special time of year where we put the gimmers (females) to the tups (males) for breeding. We must decide which group of females go to each tup. To do this we look at which features the sheep and tups have and think about how they would look together. We also use bloodlines so, if the sheep's mother was bred with a certain tup, then you might want to breed them with that same tup if you liked the result the mother gave.

On the tup's chest, we put **rud** so when the tup jumps on the sheep to mate with them, it will rub onto the sheep's bum, so you know that they have been tupped (already bred with). Every day, my dad and I go and look at the sheep to check on them and add more rud to the tup. I have a couple of my own sheep, and I love to see if they have been tupped yet.

Smitting - December

In December, we start to put a markeither spray or paint- in a certain colour, on the sheep, so we know which tup is the father and when they are due to lamb. The gestation period for a sheep is five months forward and four days back. So, for example, if the sheep was tupped on the 12th of November, then the due date would be on the 8th of April. My Dad then writes it all down into his sheep book, this process is called **smitting**. My favourite part is when I get to put the mark on the sheep. Unfortunately, I do not get to do it very often because my dad does not want me to mess it up as it is especially important. Then, we take the shearlings to a lowland farm for grazing over the winter, and we turn out the ewes to the moor. I also really enjoy doing this job too!

Fothering - January

During the harsh, winter months of January, as a family, our main job is to feed and care for the sheep up on the moor. This is called



fothering. Every day, my dad will go up the moor with a bag of **sugarbeet** and feed the hundreds of sheep we haveno matter the weather condition.

Clipping time - July

In late June and the most of July, we have the shear all our sheep. We take off the sheep's coat of wool, so they do not overheat during the summer.

We gather in all the sheep from on the moor and in the fields to clip them. As a family, we bring them all into the sheds where we shear them. If we are planning to clip a lot of sheep in one day, then we hire some contractors to help us clip them, so it is quicker and saves my Dad's back. But if they are a smaller batch, my dad and my Uncle will clip them themselves.

If the sheep are at a lowland farm, then we will go and shear them there as it is a lot easier than having to bring them back.

This is one of the only jobs which I cannot get involved in because the machine is extremely dangerous.

Hay timing - August

In August and sometimes July, my family are busy hay timing when the sun is shining. I absolutely love hay timing because the weather is (hopefully) nice and warm so running around with my siblings is always super enjoyable.

Making the hay:

To make the hay, we use a mower (a machine sort of like a lawn mower except it is used for fields) to cut the grass before dashing it. We must dash - strow- the grass about 4-5 times if we are planning to make hay but if the grass is too wet, then we need to use the grass for silage. This means that we only must strow the grass 2 or 3 times. Then, we row the grass into rows before baling it into either small bales of hay or round bales of silage. Although, small bales of hay are a lot easier because living up in the dales, it

is not as easy to be always using big machinery to transport the big bales to the sheep. This is why we like to use small bales on the back of the quad bike to take the hay to the sheep on the moor in winter.

Why do we make hay?

The reason behind why we make hay is because during the winter, when the grass is covered in snow or there is really bad weather, the sheep struggle to reach the grass. So, we take hay up the moor to give to our sheep so they can eat and will not starve.

Spaining:

August is a very busy time of month as there is a lot of things to be done. In August, we are hay timing but also spaining. Spaining is where we take the lambs off their mothers, as they must move on and look after themselves. To help me understand it, I sort of think of it as like the lambs moving out of their family's house and starting their life except, they are lambs not humans. The mothers head back to the moor without their lambs. Meanwhile, lambs are split between fields depending on whether they are keeping gimmers, wethers, tup lambs or to sell.

<u>Preparing for sales - September</u>

During September, our job is to fatten up the lambs and prepare them for breeding sales. We feed them every day and even start to make our first profits. My dad will take the fatter lambs (most weeks) to be sold for meat.

Muker Show!

Muker Show is a sheep show and one of my favourite times of the year. We prepare some sheep the same way as we do for Tan Hill Show. At this show, there are other parts of the show,

other than looking at the sheep, that children can do because although it is nice to take a look at sheep, some people can do other things such as: a bouncy castle, young handlers, the fell race - my favourite - and you can even enter things like different crafts.

Sheep sales - October

In October, we sell some of our livestock to make a profit. All the animals we are planning to sell need to be dressed and washed just like they are going to a show. First, we sell the draft ewes then the gimmers, before the most important sales which are the tup sales. My dad sells his tups in both Kirby Stephen Auction Mart and Hawes Auction Mart.

Over the two days he sells on, he also must think about buying for the years to come. Before he goes into the ring, he looks around at other farmers tups to see which ones he would like to bid for. He needs to buy a new tup, so the breeding cycle can continue on our farm. My favourite part is running around the Auction Marts with my friends although I like to watch the stock in the ring too! We may not get as many holidays as the average family, as you can see, it is not



easy to escape this busy lifestyle - but I wouldn't change it for the world.

No time for a rest, the whole

cycle starts again in November as all our livestock rely on us.


